A need for them to understand party manifestos, to recognise the importance of good governance and be in a position to make informed decisions when it comes to deciding who they would like to give the responsibility of managing our country to.

We are proudly a Round Square school and use the IDEALS of the Round Square as a scaffolding for much of what we do here. As is stated on the Round Square website, democracy goes far deeper than simply casting a vote. I quote:

“Round Square schools promote freedom of thought and speech, and appropriate forums and channels of communication are set in place to encourage student voice and debate. We bring democratic principles into the classroom, engaging students as active participants in lessons, activities and discussion that explore and demonstrate both the values of democracy and the importance of participating in democratic processes.

We will be open on Monday for a full teaching day and encourage all pupils to come to school. I have made it clear to all staff and pupils who are registered to vote that they are entitled to take as much time as is required to cast their votes and those with particular needs have been granted permission to take the day off. The support staff will be given time off to vote in their designated municipalities.
