Who said 15-year-olds can't inspire us to be better people and to face our little demons?

The Grade 9 Trek took on a different flavour this year. The usual 8-day expedition in the Soutpansberg could not go ahead as planned due to COVID-19, so the Outdoor Department at Stanford had to get creative to give the pupils an adventure they won't forget. The Trek was shortened to four days and took place much closer to home. The pupils left school on a sunny morning, on Tuesday 13th October and snaked their way along forestry roads until they reached their base camp for the next three nights – Canopy Tours in George's Valley.

The Trek was certainly a game of two halves for the pupils. Upon arrival at Canopy Tours, the group was split into two. The first group were about to be put through their paces, embarking on a 24-hour solo session equipped with only their cooking equipment, food, a pencil, sleeping bags and a poncho. Silence descended on the group as part of the experience is for them not to communicate with their peers for the specified time period. Mr Haarhoff marshalled the students to their designated sleeping spots, fifty metres apart, and so the process began of making a shelter and setting up their camps. The solo session is meant to be a time of reflection and to get lost in one's own thoughts. In the moment, the 24 hours seem like days and the session seemed arduous for the students. Perhaps the importance of the exercise and the lessons learned will only be realised in many years' time for some of them.

Whilst half of the group were absorbed in self-reflection, their peers carried on with a further three kilometre walk, winding down a narrow footpath deep into the valley, and eventually ended up at their camping spot for the night. This group delighted in their situation, mocking and jiving, knowing that their friends were suffering on "solo". After a total of 20 kilometres covered with heavy packs, the group didn't hesitate to jump into the river and cool off.

The next morning, this group was split into three smaller groups and rotated between different activities. The adrenaline junkies in the group had an absolute blast abseiling down a 28-metre cliff edge, landing on a pontoon raft in the Letaba River. They were expertly assisted by Mr Fullard, Mr Vrugtman and Miss Scheepers. They also enjoyed strapping on their harnesses once more and whizzed through the forest on a zip line tour with Mr Pietersen. They also did some bushcraft with Mrs Coetzee, learning how to make fire using four different methods, as well as walking a forest trail, discussing tracks, signs, ecology and survival methods.

That afternoon, the groups swapped around. Those that had mocked their peers the day before were now slowing descending into nervous silence as it was their time to take on the dreaded "solo". The same couldn't be said for the group who were nearing the end of their 24-hour silent experience... Rosy red cheeks were filled with contained laughter as they were bursting to giggle and joke with their friends once more. As the end of their 24 hours was announced, the group burst out in unison like humming cicadas, desperately trying to get a day's worth of stories out in only a few minutes. And everyone had a "near-death" experience to share... George's Valley must have the highest population density of phantom snakes in the country, as well as huge fantasy baboons that should be in the Guinness World Record books. The excitement and chatter echoed through the valley as they made their way down the trail to the river camping spot, where they swam in the same icy waters that their peers had enjoyed the day before.

On the Thursday evening, the two groups were reunited for a braai, kindly sponsored by the Le Roux and Klinkert families; and on Friday, they made the trek back to school, their souls slightly more full than when they departed on Tuesday.




BUDDING ADVENTURE RACERS REPRESENT SLC

BOARD OF TRUSTEES ELECTION PROCESS

Two debenture holders are due to be elected onto the Board of Trustees at Stanford Lake College. The election process is as follows:



Notice of the election was sent to all debenture holders on Wednesday, 21st October. This is at least thirty days prior to the date of election (Friday, 27th November 2020). Nominations may only be made by holders of fully paid debentures.



Each nomination must be accompanied by a brief curriculum vitae of the nominee, as well as a motivation by the nominator, setting out the reason for the nomination and the role that they feel the nominee will fulfil on the Board.

The nominee must accept the nomination in writing and acknowledge that he / she is aware of and accepts the roles and responsibilities of Trustees.



A second debenture holder must second the nomination. Nominations close on Friday, 20th November 2020.



The Trust will issue debenture holders with an official e-vote as well as a brief curriculum vitae of each nominee on Monday, 23rd November 2020.



The candidates for whom the greatest number of votes has been recorded will be declared to be duly elected members by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees on Friday, 27th November 2020. In the event that two or more nominees receive an equal number of votes, the remaining Trustees will hold a secret ballot to decide on the successful candidate.
