Matters of Principal

"Children have never been very good at listening to their elders, but they have never failed to imitate them."

We live in a rapidly changing society, driven by advances in technology, global warming, leadership crisis, moral erosion, political extremism and major social issues. Our teenagers are living in a world of instant connectivity and powerful social media... a world of artificial intelligence; a world almost disconnected from reality.

It is my opinion that in this technologydriven, distorted world, we as adults have a more important role than ever to play when it comes to guiding and mentoring our children. They are consistently receiving mixed messages about what is acceptable and what is not and about what is appropriate behaviour. We, as adults, are often quick to justify poor adolescent behaviour as children being under pressure or simply "having a little fun". We back away from any form of confrontation thereby almost justifying their behaviour.

The behaviour of a group of our matrics last week on their "40 Days" celebration to me is a very clear example of this. (Incidentally, I have heard that footage of this behaviour was shared on social media with pupils at school in Tzaneen.) The concept of celebrating 40 days should be a wonderful celebration but unfortunately this was not the case this year. This group of matrics felt it acceptable to break out of the boarding houses during the early hours of the morning, deface parts of our school, including the Headmaster's house, break into locked classrooms and write offensive comments on white boards and desks. As you can imagine, this has caused much hurt to the staff who have spent the last 4 and a half years nurturing these very pupils. In my 23 years in education, I have only witnessed one matric end of year "celebration" as demeaning as this. I was deeply disappointed in this behaviour, particularly in light of the fact that I had met with the matric group on the preceding Friday and explained to them what we, as a school, would and would not accept. A number of children chose to let themselves down and behaved inappropriately, regardless of that warning. Those that have been identified will be held accountable for their behaviour and actions.

As adults (and in particular, as educators) we have a responsibility to ensure that our pupils understand what behaviour is acceptable and we must remain steadfast in our resolve! We cannot simply excuse bad behaviour. So many of the "role models" the youth are exposed to do not subscribe to the same value system that we subscribe to as a school, values of integrity, courage and respect.

I am clear in my mind as to what I will accept on this campus and what my expectations are with regards to the behaviour of all Stanfordians at all times. What happened last Wednesday was disappointing and will not be tolerated. We will deal with this incident in a balanced, fair manner and we will move forward.

More importantly, I will be engaging with the current Grade 11 group (many of whom have expressed their disappointment at the behaviour) as to what form "40 Days" will take next year. We will certainly celebrate this milestone but we will celebrate it in a dignified manner worthy of the achievement that it is and in a manner that we can be proud of.

TWO SLC HEAD BOYS MAKE THE TOP 5




