This has finally been achieved. The implications are enormous as we can now proceed with new building projects on the campus.

We have been hoping to proceed with the upgrade of the Dining hall, modernization of the Dry Fly facility, construction of a small Sanatorium and a flat for a full-time San Sister, a new clothing shop and an upgrade to the boarding reception. This project will also include extensive upgrades to Founders South and Founders North along with much-needed upgrades to the staff accommodation in the boarding house. These are exciting times for us. There will be some disruptions for the pupils but we will endeavor to keep this to a minimum. Once we have sorted out the final details

The U/16 A girls participated in the National Interprovincial Tournament, they finished fourth out of twelve teams.


The U/18 A Boys participated in the National Interprovincial Tournament in Stellenbosch where they placed seventh out of the twelve teams in the B section.

CZECH ADVENTURE FOR LUKE

Luke Fairhead (Grade 11) was recently selected to participate in the SASACC Youth Fly Fishing Team and headed to the Czech Republic during the holidays to compete. Here is what Luke had to say about his experience:

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At the beginning of the holiday, the SASACC Youth Team departed for *Czech Republic. We arrived on the 19th and did not waste any time* as we were soon getting into some fish on the beautiful Vltava River. We stayed in the town of Vyssi Brod for the duration of the competition, as well as the five practice days beforehand, when we spent hours fishing with the Czech team, learning and refining the techniques they taught us. We were also treated to many new species of fish, such as Grayling, Perch, Chub, European Brown Trout and Brook Trout. We got to fish many beautiful rivers, and a section of the Vlatava called Devils Stones, which many believe is one of the best trout fishing areas in the world due to its secluded nature and excellent fishing opportunities. We fished five competition sessions, all on various Czech rivers. My first session went very well, as I came second in my group with 20 fish in the first hour. I managed to keep the momentum throughout the two following competition days, ending off with a 2nd and a 3rd in my last sessions. This lead to an individual placing of 8th overall at the closing ceremony. The SASACC boys did well, with our team coming 5th out of the many teams attending.

It was an enriching opportunity, competing in an amazing country, and making many new friends. I hope we have more Stanfordians who get to experience this in the years to come. I owe a massive thank you to my family for making this trip possible, as well as the Limpopo Fly Fishing Association and Stanford Lake College, who I was proud to represent in this international competition.

NEWS FROM THE CREASE

During the first week of the holiday, the 1st XI Cricket team participated in the 24th edition of the Merensky Cricket Week. This is the 17th time Stanford has participated in this week and it was a week like none before.

On Monday morning, the first team played against a highly spirited Hoërskool Bredasdorp. Stanford won the toss and elected to bat first. The openers had a great start but four quick wickets caused the Badgers to lose momentum. The score was 98 for 4 when rain interrupted play and forced an early end to the game. Ryno Schultz was outstanding with the bat and scored an unbeaten 38 for the first game. From there it became an interesting week with preparing fields and pitches. Unfortunately, Stanford didn't play a game on the Tuesday as it was scheduled for Duiwelskloof but they had too much rain for a game to take place.

On Wednesday morning, a fixture versus Hoërskool Randburg took place on Stanford's B-field. Randburg won the toss and sent the Badgers in to bat first. Stanford managed 96/6 in their allotted 20 overs. Randburg started well and from there it was impossible to stop the attack. Randburg won the game by 8 wickets. Tallen Smit and Devon Coad each took one wicket.

Late on Wednesday night, the fixture for Thursday was released and Stanford had two tough games drawn for the next day. The first against Hoërskool Garsforntein's 2nd XI in a 30-over match and the second vs Hoërskool Eldoraigne 1st XI. Garsfontein won the toss and elected to bat first. Stanford made a solid start with the ball restricting Garsfontein to 167 in their allotted 30 overs. Kabelo Mathole (an invited player) was the pick of the bowlers taking 3 wickets and he was well supported by Devon Coad taking another two wickets. Stanford made a slow start with the bat only scoring 43 runs in 15 overs which meant they had to score 125 runs in 15 overs. It was a task which Shelton Ngobeni ("an invited player" 66 off 57 balls) and Zayd Moosa (57 (not out) off 26 balls) took on and they secured Stanford a 6-wicket victory.

The afternoon's game was a different story as the Badgers only scored 83 - 9 in their allotted 25 overs. Eldorainge took to the crease and made light work of the target chasing it within 10 overs.

On Friday, Stanford faced Hoërskool Dinamika in a pink ball T20 fixture. Stanford lost the toss and was sent in to bat first. Stanford scored a mere 104 runs before being bowled out. Dinamika won by 7 wickets in the end chasing it down in 15 overs.

It was a good week out on the cricket field for the boys. Some tough lessons were learned and it was valuable preparation for the season ahead. Thanks to all the boys who offered up their holiday to represent the school.
