An aspect of this school that continually amazes me is how our pupil's self-confidence develops over the course of their time here. We talk of holistic education - an education that aims for academic excellence and the development of the 21st-Century skills that are central to our pupils leaving our school and making an impact on society. The list of 21st Century skills is endless and ever-growing. These skills can, however be placed into broad categories: Life Skills, Learning Skills and Literacy Skills.

It is these skills that, over the past 25 years at Stanford, have been inculcated into various programmes designed to ensure that our pupils are exposed to the learning of these skills. Through our excellent academic, sporting, cultural and adventure programmes, opportunities are created whereby pupils are challenged and stretched. Over the past few weeks, we have held a number of special assemblies celebrating various aspects of our school life. We have hosted an Environmental Week assembly, a Service and Awards assembly, and an assembly celebrating Freedom and Workers Day. At each of these assemblies, a number of our pupils were challenged to develop the 21st-Century skills that fall into the Life Skills basket. Public speaking, for example, can be terrifying (particularly when called on to address your peers). The same applied to dancing or singing in public. Yet time and again, our pupils are called up to the lectern and courageously put themselves out there. Not only have their public speaking skills been tested but so too have we tested their leadership, organisational and creative skills. A case in point is the Freedom Day and Workers Day celebrations. We hosted our grounds

and estates staff to an assembly and tea on Tuesday. The pupils put together a programme of dance, singing, poetry and speeches to commemorate these special days. I was particularly gratified to finally see a few of our boys displaying their cultural skills. A troop of young men performed a medley of four songs while the vibrant girls' dance crew choreographed a routine to a song from Sarafina. Add to this an extract of Amanda Gorman's poem "The Hill we Climb" and a young man speaking about finding freedom of expression in music and we had a most entertaining assembly presentation. The assembly was closed with one of our senior pupils thanking our support staff in Sepedi for all they do for us.

Further evidence of these vital skills lies in the body of this newsletter. There is a link to a YouTube video put together by four young Stanfordians. In their efforts to promote the recycling programme, they have put together a remarkable video encouraging us all to recycle. In doing so, they have demonstrated a number of skills including collaboration, communication, creativity, media literacy, technology literacy and critical thinking. This will hold them in good stead in years to come. To me, the most positive spin-off in all of this is the wonderful sense of self-confidence that our pupils slowly but surely build.

As someone wise once said: A mind once stretched to a new dimension never returns to its original shape.

Over the weekend of the 15th – 16th April, we raced with Ilne Kotzé and Mr Fullard as team Stanford Lake College at the The Mammoth Woodridge Adventure Race. We started off with a 2.5 kilometre hike which was quite fast getting us in the top five teams going into the 20 kilometre bike leg. The bike leg was full of thick sandy roads and many uphills. The next leg was a kayak / run / kayak leg which entailed a long stretch of running on the dunes. After winds, cramps, cold weather and some rain, we got to the next transition. The second bike leg was 24 kilometres with a 560 elevation gain. We had a wonderful introduction to the bike leg by having a steep climb at the start of the section where we had to push our bikes up most of the hill.

The last leg was a 14 kilometre hike where we saw some beautiful scenery and we could see Jeffreys Bay from the top of the mountain. Being able to see the finish line but knowing that you still need to do 10 kilometres of running takes away most of your motivation. Our favourite part of the race was the abseiling which was quite challenging as it was our first abseil (except for Mr Fullard who went down there in about 3 seconds). The goal was to do the abseil in daylight and we achieved it. The navigation during the night was difficult and resulted in us 'bundu bashing' out of the gorge onto the road and to the finish line. After 13 and a half hours of racing we finally crossed the finish line placing second in our category. This was a huge accomplishment as it was Ryno's and llne's first long race.






### SNAPSHOT ....
