Stanford started the chase off well but lost three quick wickets which took them to 39-4 before Connor Veldsman and Ryno Schultz put up a 64-run stand for the 5th wicket. Unfortunately, Connor lost his wicket soon after reaching his 50. Stanford fought hard but lost the game by 14 runs.

On Saturday morning Stanford faced off against Merensky. Stanford again lost the toss and was asked to bowl first.
