This made for an interesting finish with technical navigation and route choices being the deciding factor. Stanford Lake College had two teams participating, Ilne Kotzé and her brother Benno Kotzé, an old boy Stanfordian, raced in the Mixed Pairs category, finishing 4th in this category and 7th overall. A good result for a tough day out. Mr Fullard and his wife also took part in the same category and took the top spot as well as finishing 2nd overall.
