TENNIS PLAYERS SLAM UNI. LIMPOPO

An exciting afternoon of well-played tennis took place on Wednesday, 10th of August, when the Stanford students had the opportunity to play against the University of Limpopo. Our tennis players were a bit reluctant to play against young adults at first, but once they started, they were unstoppable. Some beautiful tennis was played and Stanford managed to beat their opponents. The overall score for the boys (Stefan Hacker, Luke Schoeman, Jethro Clowes, JJ Vilakazi, Jack Tasker and Quintin Swanepoel) was 30 / 19, whilst the girls (Tanatswa Murasiranwa, Michaela Gosling, Rachel Rix, Serena Rix, Ellain Chidavaenzi and Isabella Brett) won 28 / 21.



After finishing fourth in the local league, the U/14 girls went on to participate in the Noordvaal Groot B tournament that was hosted at Stanford Lake College. In the first game, the girls played against Hoërskool Oosterlig from Boksburg winning the game 1 - 0. In the second game the girls faced Hoërskool Rustenburg from North West also narrowly winning the game 1 - 0. By Sunday morning the girls knew they had qualified for the quarter finals, which made them relax a little too much, losing to Hoërskool Ligbron 0 - 1. Later that day they faced Hoërskool Dr Malan from Meyerton. After having watched the Dr Malan girls throughout the first two days, most spectators expected them to take an easy win against the Stanfordians.

However, Carmen Veldsman made sure that the opposition could not score as she saved shot after shot and on the opposite end, Olivia Turner buried a clear-cut opportunity to make sure that the Stanfordians made it through to the semi-finals. The final score was Stanford 1 - 0 Hoërskool Dr Malan.

In the semi-finals, the girls faced Hoërskool Ligbron for a second time. This time the match ended in a goalless stalemate draw which went on to a shootout. Stanford comfortably won the shootout with the final score ending 4 - 2.

In the finals, the Stanfordians faced Midstream College from Centurion. After the long weekend, both teams were clearly exhausted as most of the game was played in the middle of the field. Both keepers were barely called to action until the third quarter, when Stanford took the lead through a penalty corner goal courtesy of Mika Jones. However, the lead was very short lived as the visitors gave an instant reply. The game went on to a shootout, where the Stanfordians unfortunately lost 1 - 3.

We are extremely proud of the U/14 girls for finishing second in the tournament and raising the school flag high.
