selected but rather "when". He spoke to me after our France and Scotland tour where TUKS won both tournaments only conceding four tries at the end of the two weeks.

I carried on training with the TUKS team and was later selected to represent the Blue Bulls in the Women's IPL in the position of Outside Centre. Playing 15s was a massive adjustment for me as I wasn't used to playing such a structured rugby game. However, when I finally understood my role in the game, I had a great time playing alongside my best friends; Springbok fly-half Libbie Janse van Rensburg and Springbok Scrum-half Rumandi Potgieter. These two recently played in the Women's 15s Rugby World Cup in New Zealand.

We had a great season and with a new coaching staff and team structure we improved our log standing. Once the 15s season ended I was released back to TUKS and started playing 7s again, which felt like a breath of fresh air.

In July, we toured to Belgium where we finished second. After Belgium, I was contacted letting me know that I will be going into a camp as part of the Commonwealth Games squad. However, due to security and medical screenings, it was too short notice to play in the Commonwealth Games. However, I still learnt a lot in camp and was assured that I would play the Challenger Series in Chile in August.

I got my first debut in the senior squad of the Challenger Series and played in the number 2 jersey. Surprisingly, I was not nervous at the starting whistle of the first game, even though I was chaser for the first kick-off. All my experience playing at TUKS and for the Blue Bulls are to thank for that. I started for all the games except one. I did not play the match against China since there was a worry that I had hurt my hip in the previous game against Kenya. I played the match afterwards when two other teammates got injuries including a fractured

cheekbone and torn hand in the China game. I convinced the coach to play me again since if I did not play, we would be down 4 out of 12 players meaning we would only have one substitute. We did not perform well in that tournament, but the experience and lessons learnt were worthwhile.

My call up to the World Cup Squad was announced and I was flown in after the rest of the girls due to still being in recovery from the hip injury I sustained in Chile. My whole hip bone was bruised on the left side and my hip was displaced at the SJ joint. And since I carried on playing this caused me to severely strain muscles in my glutes and abs. I am so thankful that with rehab and rest I was able to recover to be part of the World Cup Squad two weeks after Chile.

The World Cup Camp in September was intense with 18 ladies at the start of the camp and only 12 spots available in the Squad. This healthy rivalry and pressure made me improve drastically as a player in the two weeks of camp. Every field session was a chance to prove myself and every video session a chance to learn and visualise what must still be done.

SIMPLE BEGINNINGS

In Cape Town I rubbed shoulders with the men and women who inspired me to start playing rugby. These were the people I had idolised when watching the Olympic Games and researched and copied. Now I was having coffee and laughs with them after muddy field sessions. It was an incredible experience. Unfortunately, I ended up being the 13th player and was told the day before that I would not be playing that weekend. The disappointment was something I had never experienced before; I was so ready. I could visualise myself in the scrums and running our defensive line in the opening match against France. However, it was not meant to be for me.

Despite the disappointment I will forever be thankful for coach Delport and coach Sticks (now the men's Blitzboks Head Coach) for all the time and effort they invested in me. I know that those skills and lessons were not in vain because I will use them all and build on them for future selection.

Back at TUKS, I played in the USSAs student tournament in Kimberley. I had a fantastic tournament showcasing everything I had learnt at the Boks, being the only student that was in the 14-man World Cup Training Squad. In the final match, I sustained an injury and later, after an MRI, it was determined that I had torn my ACL, meniscus and MCL. In the MRI it shows heavy bone bruising all around the knee which is not consistent with how I got injured. It was determined that the ligaments tore from overtraining and not managing myself well enough throughout the season. A tough reminder that sometimes rest is just as important as conditioning.

I am now waiting to undergo surgery on my knee to reconstruct my ACL and hopefully save my meniscus. The surgery is booked for 1 November 2022. The rehab after surgery is a minimum of 9 months, meaning I am out for the end of this season and probably out for next year's season as well.

This is disappointing considering that I had finally achieved what I had worked towards for five years. I had the chance to play in two more international tournaments (Dubai with TUKS and Cape Town 7s with the Boks). I was also aiming to be part of the squad that plays Olympic qualifiers next year in April. For now, I will focus on my rehab and aim to be better than ever when I am cleared for play in the middle of next year. I am also shifting my focus over the next few months on to coaching and other aspects of building the club at TUKS.

We wish Kirsten all the best with her upcoming surgery and recovery.

VALEDICTION & PRIZE GIVING 2022

We were blessed to have alumnus, Ali Conn (Class of 2007), address the school as our guest speaker during the Valediction Ceremony on Friday, 14th October.

In the following week's Snapshot newsletter, the Headmaster said the following, "Ali is an amazing young man who has lived an extraordinary life. During his thoroughly engaging speech, he shared some of his life experiences with us. He spoke fondly of his time at Stanford and the lessons that he had learned, many of them being taught without him even knowing. He spoke of his own Valediction and how, during that ceremony, he made an active decision to not allow his disappointment at not being awarded the prize for "The student most likely to succeed in life" to get him down. To the contrary, he made a conscious decision at that point to prove a few people wrong. And he has done just that!

"The lesson here for all of us is clear: we will be disappointed at times; we will not always get what we want in life; what is really important is how we react to these disappointments. The attitude that we adopt will go a long way to determining what we achieve. I sincerely hope that, at Stanford, we create sufficient learning opportunities (both inside and outside the classroom) to ensure that our pupils have a broad range of experiences to draw on when they finally leave our school."
