Matters of Principal

Today I am attending the Round Square Forum for schools from Africa. Simply reading the list of schools attending and looking around the room serves as a reminder of the reach of the Round Square network. As Heads, we have an opportunity to interact with school leaders from across our continent, to discuss the challenges we face, share our successes and understand a little more about one another. Not only is it a time to share best practices but also a space in which we can strengthen friendships and connections with like-minded schools. At times we take for granted the benefits of being a Round Square school. Not only do our pupils get exposure to international conferences and an excellent exchange programme but Round Square also creates opportunities for pupils across the globe to actively engage with one another through discussions held online. If I look at the opportunities advertised in this week's Round Square Weekly alone, this is one such example of a short course offered:

The History Lab is a 6-session short course on six different international history topics presented by students – from a student perspective – and open to the whole RS network.

3 IN A ROW FOR MOKGALE

On Friday last week, the athletics team travelled down the mountain to participate in the annual Frikkie Deysel Athletics meeting hosted by Merensky. The athletes faced some fierce competition with some of the biggest schools in the province

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present. A lot of athletes were tested properly on the track and field and it is impressive to say that several of them achieved personal best performances on the day. A total of 3 school records were broken and one was equalized. Stanford managed to obtain 33 medals of which 9 were silver and 6 were gold. The team managed to finish in 5th place ahead of Frans du Toit. The most remarkable performance was by Mokgale Mamabolo who won the 100m, in a time of 10.97sec, the 200m, in a time of 22.30sec (new school record), the 400m, in a time of 51.57 sec (new school record), and came 3rd in the Long Jump. These performances ensured that he won the Senior Victor Ludorum trophy for the third athletics meeting in a row. The aim of the online sessions is for students to discuss world events with a focus on sharing different local and cultural perspectives, to understand the importance of context, develop critical thinking, and enhance international understanding.

Other opportunities include "Postcards" offered by schools in different countries. A Postcard is an online Zoom discussion forum. A school identifies a topic and sends out an invitation (including some guidelines on what needs to be prepared and the age group that are invited to the discussion). An example of this is MLC School in Australia who are presenting a postcard titled "International Women's Day: Inspire Inclusion"

The invitation includes the following info:

"Join MLC School in a discussion of the International Women's Day theme, 'Inspire Inclusion', exploring how we can forge a future that seeks and values the inclusion of all women. We encourage your participation as we challenge gender discrimination and take the next steps in our commitment to investing in and including women."

Our membership of the Round Square organisation is one that we value and a relationship that allows pupils in our school to gain a global perspective.

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NEWS IN BRIEF

On Tuesday the 1st XI Cricket Boys took the long road to a hot Ellisras. Stanford won the toss and elected to bowl first. Ellisras got off to a flying start but lost their first wicket early in the second over. The opposition continued to score runs freely as Stanford battled to take wickets. Ellisras was 55 - 2 after 6 overs before a spectacular catch from Christoff van der Westhuizen off the bowling of Joshua Doolabh started the collapse of the hosts. Stanford bowled the opposition out for 86. Joshua Doolabh and Nakedi Makweya took four wickets apiece. Stanford's run chase got off to a terrible start as the Badgers found themselves in deep trouble on 8 - 4. This is when Connor Veldsman and Joshua Doolabh put on a 33-run partnership to help the team out of trouble before Joshua departed. This brought Zayd Moosa to the crease and an unbeaten 52-run partnership between Zayd (34 not out off 14 balls) and Connor (32 runs not out off 20 balls) helped Stanford to chase down the score within 9 overs to win by 5 wickets.

Last week, 15 athletes participated in the Tzaneen Region Athletics Championships. Eleven athletes made it through to the Ritavi Region Athletics Championships and of those, 9 athletes qualified for the Mopani Championship which will take place at Ben Vorster on Saturday.


