As we navigate this busy term, I encourage all students to approach their days with intention, plan effectively, work diligently, and stay grounded in the values that define our school.

The coming weeks are an opportunity not just to achieve academically, but to demonstrate character, focus, and perseverance.



Let's get ready for a great weekend of cricket — full of energy, teamwork, and Stanford spirit!




Exploring the Wolkberg
