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Matters of Principal

As a community we need to be proactive as we prepare for the possible consequences as the Covid – 19 virus continues to spread across the globe. At Stanford Lake College we are closely monitoring developments nationwide. We are in constant communication with Isasa and other schools as well as keeping in contact with the NICD via their website. As this outbreak evolves it is important that we are proactive and prepare for any eventuality.

Currently at school we are emphasising good hygiene and in particular regular hand washing and appropriate covering of mouth and nose when coughing and sneezing. We have made alcohol based hand sanitisers available in strategic spaces around the school, we have replaced all hand towels in the bathrooms with paper towels and are encouraging students to minimise personal contact.

At this stage the sports programme will continue as planned. During the course of next week, I will be in contact with the Headmistress of Beaulieu College with regards to the Derby weekend. I am very aware that parents have booked accommodation and made travel plans with major cost implications but we will make a decision based on the best interests of our respective communities. We are also monitoring the situation in connection with our upcoming PMB hockey tours and the St Dunstan's Easter Sports festival. The Round Square conferences in Kenya and Cape Town have been cancelled. The cultural extravaganza at Mitchell House will take place on Saturday, our open weekend will go ahead as will the Wik.

At this stage there is no indication that the Education Department will force the closure of schools but we need to be ready for every eventuality. The staff have been requested to set up Google Classrooms and all pupils have been invited onto the platform. We will ensure that all pupils are familiar with the platform. The Google Classroom platform will enable us to ensure that teaching and learning continues to take place in the event of the school closing. A challenge that does exists is pupil access to devices and decent connectivity during this period of time. Can I please request that you ensure that your child will have access to data and connectivity should they require it. In this eventuality pupils will have to be disciplined, self-motivated and accountable for their learning.

As parents you can assist us in the following ways:

• Remain calm and rational in the messages that you share with your children, we cannot afford to spread panic. We are taking advice and direction from the trained professionals and national authorities.

• If you feel that your child is exhibiting any of the symptoms of Covid 19 please do not send him or her back to school. Please follow the guidelines published by the authorities in dealing with your child and making contact with the necessary medical personnel.

 \cdot Should we become concerned about a pupil on campus we will isolate the pupil and request that they be collected by their parents. We have a plan in place for pupils whose parents cannot collect them.

As most of you are aware the venue for our Matric dance is being used as a quarantine facility for South Africans returning from China. As has been reported in the press, all returning nationals are disease free at this stage and the quarantine is a precautionary measure. I have been in contact with the General Manager of the Resort and I have an assurance that this process will not impact on our dance. I have also been given an assurance that we can postpone the bookings to a later date if required.

This is a rapidly developing scenario with regular updates coming in from the various stakeholders and we will continue to monitor all developments and communicate with our parent body. Your support and cooperation during this challenging time will be greatly appreciated.
