

Matters of Principal

Last week I received a WhatsApp from an ex-pupil I taught during my time at Michaelhouse. He went on to study at Rhodes University. Whilst I was teaching in Grahamstown I was fortunate enough to bump into him a few times. An amazing young man whom I see myself as fortunate to have crossed paths with. The essence of his WhatsApp message was that he was driving past on his way to see his Grandparents and was keen to pop in for a catch up. Unfortunately, we were out and were unable to meet but have made a plan to catch up next time he is in the area. His Grandfather is Dr Reuel Khoza well known South African businessman and author of one of my favourite books on leadership: ATTUNED LEADERSHIP African Humanism as Compass.

In his acknowledgements at the beginning of the book, Dr Khoza speaks of his journey to find an appropriate organisational and leadership model for modern South Africa; it was this that lead him to a renewed understanding of the role of Ubuntu in leadership. In his view Ubuntu needs to be seen as Africa's compass for governance and much of his subsequent work has centred on bringing African Humanism to the attention of the world. He speaks of the words of Steve Biko who suggested that in the long run, the special contribution to the world by Africa will be in the field of human relationships. Biko believed that Africa would give the world a more human face. He urges us to focus on our ability to grow our understanding of one another and to collaborate in order to foster positive change. Khoza says that Ubuntu is generally regarded as the foundation of sound human relations in African society.

"Umuntu ngumuntu ngabantu" - "A person is a person through other persons"

> "Rintiho rinse a ri nusi hove" "One finger cannot pick up a grain."

There is so much to be learnt from the reading and researching of African leadership but none more so than about the importance of Ubuntu. As a school we have identified this as one of our core values, I encourage us all to internalise this value and to live it to the best of our abilities. In the times that we are currently living in it is highly apparent that we need each other. We are social beings and functional relationships are key to our happiness and wellness.



On the very hilly route there were also some amazing descents and we reached speeds just short of 100km/h (98.2)! At the 30km mark there was an opportunity to see far ahead, where I timed myself about 2 minutes behind Alan and 2 minutes ahead of Gunther. We were nearly half way and knowing the last 15kms would be one long descent, brought comfort to the mind a bit and we were able put out bigger efforts than usual.

At 55kms in, my legs were cramping! I could see Gunther behind me and we were going up a climb, the very same gruelling climb we went up this morning. I looked at Gunther and he looked at me, both exhausted. Then we saw Alan coming from the front, shouting at us that we are on the wrong route and we have to turn around. For the first time ever, I was relieved to be on the wrong route! I did not see where I would get the power to go up that same brutal climb.

We raced halfway down the hill and back up for a bit to find the correct turn off. The three of us were together now, pushing as hard as we can, joking about the possibility of an Insect Science sprint finish. We could see the end, travelling over 50km/h down a single-track, passing the supporters and 35km riders.

Alan swerved for a rock and it was just too quick for me to react directly behind him! I went over my handlebars. Gunther, behind me, went over me and we both ended up on the ground, with less than a kilometre left to finish. The fourth rider was in sight so we jumped up just to realise that I only had half a handlebar attached to my bike and Gunther with a broken Wahoo. Unable to sprint, we all finished close together on the 60km loop (or in Alan's case 65km and for us, 63km – haha!). We experienced a brutal 1850m of elevation gain.

I think every rider appreciated the effort of the organisers for putting up a race in such a short period of time and giving us the opportunity to be able to race.



Two Stanfordians competed in the Akkedis MTB Challenge this weekend. Herman Fourie and Gunther Katzke joined their Insect Science teammate, Alan Gordon, on the trail.

Herman wrote the following account of the race:

The race started at 07:30 and it was quite warm from the start of the race. The start was slow with quite a few people keeping up, until Alan started increasing the pace up the first climb until it was only me, Alan and Gunther. About six kilometres into the race we made it to the Skilpad Climb where Gunther slowly fell behind. Here I had to make a choice - to try and stick with Alan or with Gunther, knowing that Alan is a very strong rider and that I will likely burn out.

From then on, it was me and Alan, with Gunther chasing us up probably the hardest climb I've ever done, reaching gradients at the steepest sections of over 20%! I was able to stay with Alan until about half way up the climb, then I was left behind. At this stage, it was Alan in the lead, me chasing Alan and Gunther chasing me. Each one of us knew we could not take a moment's rest because the person behind would make up that time.
