My wife and I have entered a very new phase of parenting with our daughter, Megan. She has graduated from University and is finding her way as an intern in the working world. It has been a baptism of fire for her, to say the least! As educators, we have needed to reflect on how nurturing and protective our schools are. Whilst it may not seem like it to our pupils, we protect and buffer them from so much whilst at the same time, doing our very best to prepare them for a challenging world outside of school. University offers a small step into this world but again, our children are largely protected from the real challenges that they will face. We were adamant that both of our children had to have part-time jobs whilst at university. They chose to work in restaurants - an environment where many lessons are learned, particularly regarding how people behave and interact. From difficult clients to managers who feel the need to exercise their authority, to people who are downright lazy and dishonest, this time was a learning curve and yet still not the real world entirely.

In the working world, there are no soft landings or bailouts. It becomes the survival of the fittest. One of the greatest learnings for her has been understanding the masks that people find themselves wearing in a working environment. Society creates situations where people (both adults and children) find themselves feeling forced to

wear figurative masks and behave in a manner that they believe aligns with a particular role. We see this in schools all the time. The learnings I have reflected on are two-fold:

We must continue to teach our children the skills to navigate, with courage and confidence, a tricky world that can be cruel whilst maintaining their value system;

We must continue to empower our pupils to be themselves, to remove these masks and be authentic.

It is impossible to be authentic if one is "playing" a role or wearing a mask. It is impossible to be all things to all people at all times. Our school needs to be a safe space in which our pupils can be themselves.
