## Matters of Principal

Last week I attended a talk at Unicorn presented by The Digital Law Company. I have seen this presentation before but I found it to be a very useful reminder of the dangers and pitfalls that are associated with the uncontrolled use of smartphones and social media by adolescents. Most notable to me was the reminder from the presenter Ms Carla Pretorius that we, as adults, legally own the phones we give to our children and so have 100% control over them. That said we can also be implicated and held liable in any unacceptable activity that takes place whilst these phones are in use. We CAN and MUST make the rules!

It is important to remember that social media use and sensible use of smartphones can be advantageous to all of us when properly monitored and controlled. Unfortunately, as adults, we have been poor in exercising effective control of these devices and putting in place the required securities in order to protect our children. There is well-documented evidence that speaks to the addictive effect of social media, the social factors associated with accumulating online likes and the negative impact that this has on pupil mental wellness. Carla spoke of the desire that people have to be liked and followed online and made a comparison to our physical lives. Many of our kids will have thousands of online followers on Instagram and TikTok but when asked how many real friends they have, the answer always comes back as a handful. Carla suggests that our online lives should mirror our physical lives and unless we actually know the person and have physically touched them we should not befriend them online. I am sure all of us adults will remember the conversation with our parents in the 80's and 90's about the man in the panel van driving around the neighborhood offering children sweets. We were warned not to go near him as we did not know him and had no idea of his intentions. This analogy should be used when it comes to our children accepting friendship requests online. Predators are out there, they create profiles that are misleading and lure people in and then they strike!

There is plenty of information out there that we can access in order to better educate and, therefore, protect our pupils in this space.
