This week we had two very productive Board sub-committee meetings. One of the topics that came up in discussion during the PR committee meeting was that of social media and the effective use thereof. We considered the value of positive messages being spread in our community and the manner in which social media could be used to promote the excellent work that is being done in our school. Yet, as with so many things in this world, social media platforms come with some high risk factors. Irresponsible or inappropriate use of social media platforms can be extremely harmful.

The use of technology has become a significant component that facilitates harm in the sexual exploitation of children, radicalization, sexual predation and more. To foster awareness, an effective approach to online safety needs to be in place to empower a school to protect and educate the whole school community in their use of technology and establishes mechanisms to identify, intervene and escalate any incident where appropriate.

The breadth of issues classified within online safety is considerable, but can be categorized into three areas of risk:

- **content:** being exposed to illegal, inappropriate or harmful material; e.g. pornography, fake news, racist or radical and extremist views.
- **contact:** being subjected to harmful online interaction with other users; e.g. commercial advertising as well as adults posing as children or young adults (cat-fishing).
- **conduct:** personal online behaviour that increases the likelihood of, or causes, harm; e.g. making, sending and receiving explicit images, or online bullying or blackmail.

The widespread availability and use of social media applications such as Facebook, Instagram, Instant Messaging, Snapchat, TikTok and Twitter bring opportunities to understand, engage, and communicate in new and exciting ways. It is important that we are able to use these technologies and services effectively and flexibly. This must, however, be balanced this with our duties to our school, the community, our legal responsibilities and our reputation.

With this in mind, it is essential that as adults we take responsibility for how we use social media platforms ourselves and, equally importantly, how we educate our children to use it safely and effectively.
