
NEWS IN BRIEF

Last weekend, Tristan Brett and Mr Fullard took part in the first race of the 2023 Adventure Racing Africa Series. This event took place at the Mnweni Cultural Village deep in the Drakensburg. Mr Fullard was roped in as a last minute replacement for a sick team member, racing with team Truffle Hunters. The team consisted of Tristan, Mr Fullard, Franco Olivier and Piers Pirow. This was also the team with the biggest age difference at the event, with Tristan being 16 and Piers, the experienced man, over 50 already. They competed in the 180km race distance which started at 17:00 on the Friday afternoon, racing into the night and cut-off being only Sunday morning. The team did very well, nailing the navigation and keeping a high pace, especially over the first two legs where they managed to stay in the lead, ahead of the raining SA series champions, team Merrel Songlines. Merrel took over the lead from leg three, a mountain biking leg where team Truffle Hunters ran into some mechanical issues. They managed to break a chain and repair it and then broke a front-derailleur, forcing the team to really work together to keep a good pace. Truffle Hunters managed to keep second place to the end of the race.

The race was very tough with weather conditions ranging from scorching heat to cold nights, raging winds, rain, hail and hectic thunder and lightning. The fourth leg was extremely tough, but one of the most beautiful and mind-blowing sections of the race. A hike up Rockeries Pass to the top of the Drakensberg, stopping at the origin of the Orange River and down the other side on the Mnweni Pass. This hike leg was 31km in distance with over 2000m of ascent and descent. With very warm temperatures, it took the team 12 hours to complete.

After that there were three legs left; a bike leg to the dam, a paddle leg, and then a very interesting bike / hike leg to the finish. Due to the thunder and lightning with heavy rain, the organisers cancelled the paddle leg for safety reasons. The team waited out the storm at the Dam before continuing on the last bike / hike leg. This last leg was 18km in length, of which 5km was hike-a-bike, meaning you carry your bike over unrideable terrain. The addition of the heavy rain made this section extremely muddy, making the hike-a-bike section slightly longer with very slippery terrain and bikes clogging up due to the clay mud. Doing this section at night with no moon and heavy cloud cover made the navigation tricky as well, but the team took it easy and managed to complete the section with bikes intact. The

team stayed strong throughout the race, supporting each other and working well together. They finished in second place in a total time of 33 hours and 50 minutes. A massive thank you to the Brett family that made this race possible and supported the team all the way through. Well done to Tristan and Mr Fullard on a great race.
