For Arbor Day, our scholars planted several *Celtis africana* (White Stinkwood) trees along our beautiful Lake. This initiative ensures that as the current trees eventually reach the end of their life cycle, a new generation of trees will already be thriving.

The White Stinkwood is a resilient and fast-growing indigenous tree, valued for its wide shade, graceful foliage, and the habitat it provides for birds and insects.

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By planting these trees, our students are not only beautifying the campus but also making a lasting contribution to biodiversity and sustainability for future generations.





The Grade 10 members of the Environmental Committee had the chance to work with Mokgale Maenetje and his team from Kruger2Canyon. They introduced us to the SASS method (South African Scoring System), a simple way to check the health of rivers. By collecting and identifying small water creatures like mayflies, dragonflies, and snails, we can tell if the water is clean or polluted. Sensitive species means good water quality, while tolerant ones show pollution. We hope to assist them in their monthly water monitoring in the future – making a real difference to our environment!
