Why Stanford Lake College Prioritises Adventure in Learning

Our Grade 10 pupils will soon embark on their final expedition as a group of Stanford Lake College pupils. This is an exciting moment for them, and they will once again have the chance to learn valuable lessons about themselves and their friends.

As the Grade 12s near the completion of their final exams, I would like to thank them for everything they have contributed to the school over the past five years. We wish them safe travels to their various destinations as they celebrate their achievements.

The Grade 8, 9 and 11 pupils still have just over a week of examinations remaining, and we encourage them to stay focused and committed to the task at hand.

The 'WHY' Factor

At Stanford Lake College, adventure is not an extra; it is an essential part of how we help young people grow. The outdoors gives pupils the space to explore who they are, what they can do, and how they respond when things become challenging. These experiences build skills that cannot be taught in a classroom alone and shape young people in ways that last well beyond their time at school.

Outdoor learning allows pupils to take safe and supported risks. Whether they are hiking, paddling, cycling, or completing teamwork challenges, they learn to manage discomfort, stay calm under pressure, and push beyond what they thought possible. These moments help them develop resilience, a key skill in adolescent life and a strong protective factor for mental wellbeing. When pupils overcome real challenges outdoors, they gain confidence that transfers directly into academic and social spaces.

Adventure activities also strengthen leadership. Pupils learn to communicate clearly, listen to others, and make decisions that affect their group. They take turns leading, supporting, problem-solving and reflecting on what worked and what did not. These are practical, lived lessons in responsibility and teamwork. They learn that leadership is not about being the loudest voice, but about guiding others, staying reliable, and keeping a steady mindset.

The outdoors also builds courage. Facing a steep climb, a cold morning paddle, or a long trail teaches pupils to persevere. They discover that courage is often quiet: the choice to keep moving, to trust a team member, or to try again after a setback. These experiences help pupils understand themselves better and build self-belief. Our adventure programme supports academic learning too. Pupils develop critical thinking, planning, reflection, and awareness of their environment, skills that strengthen problem-solving in the classroom. They learn discipline, preparation, and the value of consistent effort. Many activities also connect directly to subjects such as Life Sciences, Geography, and Physical Education.

Most importantly, adventure teaches pupils to work with others, appreciate different strengths, and act with empathy. When pupils help each other through a difficult task, they build trust and deepen relationships. Stanford Lake College continues to invest in outdoor education because it creates balanced, confident and capable young people. Adventure shapes character. It prepares pupils for life.

LION RESCUE UKRAINE

Summary of Our Recent Trip from South Africa to Poland

My dad, Anthony Peniston, my brother Tiger, mom and I recently set out on an unbelievable mission to rescue lions from Ukraine — a mission that turned into one of the most intense and unforgettable experiences of our lives. After meeting the Mr Beast team at the Ukrainian border, my dad helped dart, prepare, and load the lions before beginning a 72-hour nonstop journey back to South Africa. Today, those lions are living freely in the bushveld on our property in Alldays, at our lion sanctuary.

One of the craziest parts of the trip? Tiger and I were teamed up with the MR BEAST crew. Yes — that Mr Beast. While we were staying with them, Russia launched a drone attack over the town we were in. The airport went into lockdown for 24 hours, delaying everything. At the same time, Qatar Airways — who generously sponsored the cargo plane — had to reroute and reorganise after bombings shook Doha.

Despite all the chaos, the rescue was a massive success thanks to an incredible team effort. Mr Beast even featured a part of the journey on his channel. Maj, one of the main Mr Beast team members, travelled with my dad from the Ukraine border all the way to the lions' release on our farm — capturing every moment.

This mission took months of planning. My dad worked closely with Natalia Popova in Ukraine to make it happen. It was his second mission into Ukraine, and he's already preparing to go back in February 2026 — hopefully to a country that's finally at peace.


