Students from various countries gathered in the vibrant city of Arusha, Tanzania, for the Round Square conference, an event focused on preparing young minds for the challenges of the future. After enduring a grueling journey, delegates arrived at their accommodation, appreciating the simple luxury of electricity to charge their phones.

Hosted by a Greek-founded school, St Constantine's International School, with a rich 71-year history, the conference brought together 107 students and 25 teachers from 16 schools across six countries, including India, Kenya, Bermuda, Tanzania, South Africa, and Rwanda. The conference theme, 'Tomorrow's Nation,' aimed to explore the essential skills beyond textbooks necessary to equip students for a rapidly changing world. It emphasised the significance of embracing diversity and cultivating ethical decision-making abilities.

The conference kicked off with a captivating cultural performance by the host school, setting the stage for the days to come. Attendees then gathered in their Barazza groups, engaging in delightful dinners that fostered new friendships and connections. The importance of rest after a tiring journey was not lost on the delegates, who gratefully embraced a well-deserved night of rest.

The first day of the conference was packed with activities. Delegates embarked on an excursion to the Africa Art Gallery, immersing themselves in the country's most exquisite artistic displays. We also visited the Plaster House, a charitable organisation dedicated to helping underprivileged children with surgically treatable disabilities. Meanwhile, the students had the privilege of listening to four keynote speakers who addressed pressing issues, including the crisis of female genital mutilation among young girls in the Maasai tribe. The day concluded with a traditional dinner at the cultural centre, strengthening the bonds formed within the Barazza groups.

The second day began with an early start as delegates packed their belongings and embarked on exciting adventures. Some ventured on a thrilling zip-lining experience, whereafter we embarked on a 10-kilometre bike ride through a local village, culminating at the stunning Lake Manyara. There, they learned about the unique quali-

ties of the saltwater Lake Manyara and even had encounters with hippos. As night fell, the group set up camp, relishing in a satisfying meal and rejuvenating showers.

On the third day, the delegates embarked on a breathtaking journey toward the Ngorongoro Crater, a magnificent landscape thriving with wildlife. Observing the wonders of nature, including coffee breaks with the majestic hippos, left an indelible impression on all. As the day drew to a close, the delegates returned to their accommodation, preparing for the closing ceremony.

The closing ceremony featured the symbolic act of taking down the flags and returning them to their respective flag bearers. A conference video showcasing cherished memories evoked emotions, reminding everyone of the transformative experiences shared. The gathering concluded with a grand gala dinner, filled with joyous singing and a spirited disco party enjoyed by the delegates.

The Round Square conference successfully bridged the gaps between diverse backgrounds, fostering a deeper understanding of the world and the importance of preparing students for the challenges that lie ahead. It left participants with lasting memories, new friendships, and a renewed sense of purpose as they returned to their respective schools, carrying the lessons learned in Arusha with them.




